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Tammy Osburn's Success Story

Tammy Osburn met with Youth Service Specialist, Rachel Harris, at the CDSA office on 09/12/2015. Tammy was 20 years old and was seeking guidance to assist her in finishing school. Initially, she was a soft spoken young woman who over time allowed herself to be vulnerable and share her story with her case manager. Tammy had experienced great heartache in her short life. She became pregnant

while in high school. Following the birth and soon thereafter death of her son, Ezekiel, to medical complications, Tammy dropped out of high school her sophomore year.

Once enrolled in the WIOA program she was adamant about doing what it took to get her life back on track. She was referred to the Youth Build Program at CDSA. In September, she participated in Youth Build's mental toughness. It entailed two strict weeks of zero tolerance with mandatory perfect attendance, punctuality, and good attitude. In October, she was welomed to come aboard as an official Youth Build student. Over the course of he next few months, Tammy and her WIOA Case Manager worked hard to address all of her goals. Tammy participated in several leadership development activities where she learned about budgeting and managing a checkbook. She also participated in a job readiness workshop where she learned about work-site expectations, how to properly fill out a job application, and form a resume. This led to a work experience opportunity at the Garfield County Health Department.

Upon enrollment, Tammy was basic skills deficient in Math and Reading. Her commitment to working diligently on her Penn Foster High School Program and with tutoring sessions, she went from being basic skills deficient in Math with a score of 6.4 and a Reading score of 7.7 to having post TABE scores of 12.9 in both areas. Meanwhile, she also worked on key training modules and earned a Bronze Career Ready Certificate. On January 19, 2016, Tammy was among the first in Youth Build to complete her online school program and earn a high school diploma. She went on to receive other leadership development opportunities where she learned about community and service learning and civic responsibility, opting to register to vote. She was also exposed to post-secondary opportunities which led her to enroll in the Phlebotomy program at Autry Tech where she successfully attained her phlebotomy certificate. Today, Tammy is attending classes at Northern Oklahoma College in Enid with aspirations of becoming a nurse. She is a more confident young woman who has a plan and direction for her life and is excited about her future.



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Rebecca Anson Excels

Rebecca Anson started the WIOA Youth program with NOYS May of 2016, which also happened to be her 17th birthday. At that time, Rebecca was a young mom of a 20 month old little boy and also a student at Teen Pep program with Ponca City Schools. By the end of May 2016, Rebecca had received her high school diploma and was working at Arby's while her family assisted her by watching her son while she worked. Rebecca has a great support system with her family and her son's father is very active in their lives. Eventually he and Rebecca plan on getting married and living together as a family with their son.

Rebecca's dream job would be to get her RN license. Rebecca stated in her youth application: "I have always wanted to work in the medical field because I want to help people when they are sick and wounded."

Through the WIOA Youth Program Rebecca was able to start her journey in healthcare. Rebecca attended the Certified Nurse Aid program at Pioneer Technology Center. She completed the course, received her CNA certification, and was offered a job with Via Christi making \$11.00 an hour. Rebecca gave notice at Arby's and started her new job as a CNA on 07/12/2016.

Rebecca is a determined, goal oriented individual. She continues to make good decisions for herself and her son, working toward creating an independent life for them after she turns 18. Rebecca plans on saving money to reach this goal and eventually she will pursue more training as an LPN or RN. Rebecca should be very proud of her accomplishments.

Scott Taylor was laid off from Cameron Compression in Ponca City in December of 2013 after eight years of employment with the company. Cameron Compression closed and all employees were eligible for Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA). Scott attended a TAA Informational Meeting at the Ponca City Workforce Office and was torn between training (TAA) or Reemployment Trade Adjustment Assistance (RTAA), which is a program for people over the age of 50. After discussing his op-




